

PREPARING FOR CHIROPRACTIC SCHOOL

A bachelor's degree is not required for admission to a Doctor of Chiropractic Program (DCP), but it is required for licensure in many states. Pre-chiropractic is not a major. There is no preferred major for those who choose to complete a bachelor's degree at K-State. According to the Association of Chiropractic Colleges, prerequisites for the Doctor of Chiropractic degree are completion of 90 hours which must include a minimum of 24 hours in life and physical science courses, half with labs.

Other recommendations include a well-rounded general education program in the humanities and social sciences, and other coursework relevant to successful completion of a DCP. The courses listed below meet the prerequisites recommended by the Council on Chiropractic Education (CCE).

- Requirements at individual chiropractic schools vary.
- Students are responsible for knowing and completing the requirements of their major (if they plan to earn a bachelor's degree at K-State) and the chiropractic schools to which they plan to apply.
- Early and regular consultation with a health professions advisor is recommended.
